


# **ACTIVITY REPORT**

April 2017 to March 2018



The mission of Hong Kong Unison is to ensure ethnic minority residents in Hong Kong are treated with equal respect and concern by the authorities. We are a human-rights based organization aiming at eliminating racial discrimination in Hong Kong. We are most concerned about the lack of equitable education opportunities and the flaws in laws and policies, which adversely impact the lives of ethnic minorities.

#### Education

Unison believes all children, regardless of their skin colors, have the right to quality education. With the disproportionate ratio of South Asians in poverty, we believe an **equitable education** is the path to upward social mobility.



Through research evidence, we inform policymakers the gaps in the education system and the needs of ethnic minorities. We conducted three major studies.



Unison is pleased that our persistent efforts have led to government's positive support for ethnic minorities.



## **Racial Equality**

The Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO) is the weakest of the four discrimination ordinances in Hong Kong. Unison calls on the government to **amend the RDO** to include nationality, immigration status and language-based discrimination as part of its prohibited grounds and to extend its coverage to all government powers, including law enforcement. Unison has also been actively promoting the **reform of the Equal Opportunities Commission** (EOC) to enhance its complaints process so that more aggrieved persons can access EOC's legal services.

## **Community Organizing**

To create a stronger voice to be heard, Unison believes that ethnic minorities must come together and act in their shared self-interest to generate collective power.

Unison mobilize ethnic minority children, youth, and parents to speak at public hearings, Town Halls, Poverty Summit, etc. to voice out their situation and needs. We enhance parents' knowledge in the local education system by conducting workshops; and through social actions, focus group and concern group discussions, they put forward policy suggestions on issues relevant to their community.





## **Youth Development**

Unison is committed to motivating and developing ethnic minority youth as they are the future pillars of Hong Kong. We conducted **34** career guidance and life planning workshops for secondary four to six students and led more than **200** secondary five and six students to visit **16** different companies and organizations for workplace visits to instill hope and inspiration in the young ethnic minority generation towards a better and brighter future. Secondary youths are most enthused by the sharing of scholarship awardees.

In the 2017/18 school year, **6** ethnic minority students who scored "2" and above in DSE (Chinese) and **13** who scored "B" and above in GCE(AL) Chinese were awarded Unison Chinese Performance Scholarships. In addition, **24** brilliant ethnic minority students were granted Unison Tertiary Education Scholarships. We provided capacity training to the awardees to increase their awareness of their rights, take actions toward an equitable education, and speak up in defense of the needed policy reforms. We strive to enable them to contribute meaningfully to Hong Kong and become civic-minded citizens.

### **Public Education**

To promote cultural sensitivity and break racial stereotypes, Unison conducted more than 21 talks with primary and secondary schools, colleges, universities, Education Bureau, Employment Retraining Board, Law Society, etc. for education and social work students, teachers, social workers, civil servants, and lawyers.

To stimulate discussion on institutional racism in the education system, Unison organized the Pan-Asian Human Rights Mooting Competition jointly with the University of Hong Kong's Centre for Comparative and Public Law. Seven teams were selected in the oral rounds of the Competition including law schools from Australia, China, Hong Kong, the Philippines, and Singapore.

To further raise awareness of the challenges faced by ethnic minorities, Unison organized a News Story Video Competition as news is an effective medium through which the mainstream society learns about ethnic minorities' experience in education, employment, access to public services, etc., and explores the nuanced social dynamics.


